

## NOTARY PUBLIC



*The State of Texas Government Code Ann. § 406.024 sets out the maximum fees a Notary Public may charge for notary public services. The table below list each notarial act and the state fee.*

Notary Service	Fee
First signature of each individual document	\$6
Each additional signature of each individual document	\$1
Administering an oath or affirmation	\$6
Taking the deposition of witness, for each 100 words	\$0.50
Swearing a witness to a deposition	\$6
Protesting a bill or note	\$4
Each additional notice of protest	\$1
Protesting in all other cases	\$4
Certified copy (copies not included, must be made by the notary)	\$6
Uncertified copy of an entry from a notary's record book, per page	\$0.50
All notarial acts not provided for	\$6

  

Travel	Fee
0 – 5 miles	\$10
5 – 15 miles	\$15
15+ miles	\$1 per mile
After hours 5 PM to 9 PM, 6 AM to 9 AM, and weekends	\$20
Late night or emergency 9 PM to 6 AM	\$50

  

Location Charges	Fee
Hospitals and Nursing Homes, 30 minutes at location*	\$40
Jails and Detention Centers 1 hour at location	\$80
Excessive Wait Time per hour, more than 30 minutes at location	\$35
Airport Terminal Fee	\$50
